Greetings Fellow Supplers,

As 2022 comes to a close and most of us are knee deep in holiday mode, it provides us with the perfect opportunity to reflect on the year that was and look forward to the new year to come. We are pleased to report that the Gild has persevered through the COVID lockdown era and, alongside the natural gas business that we humbly serve, returned with the typical ebbs and flows of the annual business cycles that we traditionally anticipate from our side of the industry, albeit with a few notable changes to highlight from this past year.

The American Gas Association's Annual Operations Conference, the highlight event for our industry each year, was held in New Orleans LA as scheduled in early May. This was the first AGA Ops Conference in several years to go off as planned. Additionally, the APGA as well as the majority of the Regional Associations returned to a normal schedule, which provided us all with the ability to reconnect in the flesh with our fellow Gild members during the course of the year. Although Teams and Zoom meetings were a good alternative as a means of keeping in contact with everyone during the lockdown era, the sense of comradery and fellowship that one feels upon physically interacting with our fellow Gild members was thoroughly gratifying and stirred emotions and memories of why we all are Gild members in the first place. Simply put, it is great to be back at full throttle!!!

The changes in our industry have been considerable over this past year as well and, despite what some outside our industry might think, the natural gas industry is not only surviving but thriving and will continue to do so for the foreseeable future. During this past year the natural gas industry has seen unprecedented increases in the level of LNG (Liquified Natural Gas) exports and in fact the USA has become the #1 exporter of LNG worldwide as per the US Governments Energy Information Administration (EIA)

Also, the EIA has noted that dry natural gas production in the USA has set monthly records for both October and November of 2022 and they are projecting an annual record will be set once all the data is compiled for years end. As for the Gild itself, there have been changes to long standing traditions that have come to pass in 2022. After a poll of our community, we collectively voted to retire the capes and replace them with sports jackets and polo shirts. While this represents a departure from our legacy traditions and customs, the timing was right to migrate to a new tradition that should serve us well moving forward, especially with the Millennials and Gen Z folks who will be entering the business and moving the industry forward in the coming generations.

The Gild itself has seen a slight increase in membership, growing to 193 members, up from 191 members from this point in time last year. As always, please keep on the lookout for those in the industry who you feel are "Gild Worthy" and put forth a nomination for any candidate that meets our criteria. The process and honor of being selected as a Gild member and being identified by your peers as being one of the "best of the best" in our industry represents one of the most prestigious personal honors one can achieve during the course of one's career.

Philanthropically we continue to be active and charitable to the industry at large. We put our resources to good work in 2022, which reflects favorably on the Gild as an organization while concurrently providing financial assistance to worthy causes that everybody can get behind and support. We continued the tradition of awarding a \$2500 scholarship to a deserving student who is studying for a career in the natural gas industry.

This year's recipient was Mr. Peter Reese from the Bridge Valley Community and Technical College out of South Charleston WV. Peter has a family, is working full time and is going to college later in life. The scholarship money was well received by Peter and we are happy to assist such a worthy recipient.

We are also continuing to reflect as to how we serve our own Gild Community moving forward. With the emergence of the "Gild Gathering" as a viable alternative to the traditional Gild Breakfast, we will be providing some documented guidance in the coming months for all the Wardens and Alderman to follow as it relates to hosting these events. Stay tuned, as we anticipate these guidelines to be issued in time for the SGA Spring Gas Conference in Charlotte NC in March of 2023. The good news is that the playing cards have been a bona fide success with our membership, and we have received orders for thousands of decks that were recently backfilled based upon the large demand. The bad news is that the most recent printing of the cards resulted in them not including the pips nor the King/Queen/Jack insignias. We are in the process of getting this sorted with the vendor, but for those of you who have issued the cards, please take note and make arrangements with Anne for a swap out to take place. As the natural gas facts were printed solo, the only silver lining here is that anyone who opened the faux playing cards will be a natural gas expert in short order if they rummage through the deck wondering what happened

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank everybody who has participated in the Gild in some form or fashion in 2022. The effort put into our organization by its entire membership has allowed the Gild to endure even in these most turbulent of times. As such, the effort put forth is recognized and appreciated by all the Officers and Senior Leadership.
